

## Questers Group Two Years Old

Junior Organization Begun by the Women's Club.

The Questers' Club was organized Feb. 19, f935, in answer to a demand from the Montclair Women's Club for an organization similar to their own which their daughters might enjoy. The suggestion of a junior club was introduced to the daughters and their friends by the president of the Women's Club, Mrs. Robert Lyman Grant, at a reception given for the girls by the club the preceding December. A welcome also was extended by Mrs. Frederick H. Amerman, who has acted since in an advisory capacity to the Questers.

The plan was received with such enthusiastic approval that Mrs. Frederick Griswold Jr. was immediately appointed senior advisor of the new group. Credit in carrying out the wishes of the Women's Club to organize the daughters must also go to Miss Gertrude Clayton and many other friends of the Questers in the Women's Club.

The next meeting of the girls we in January, when a salmagundi part was planned. The meeting was suc a success that it was decided to hol regular meetings on alternate Tues day evenings. ## Community Club Serves North End of Montclair Activities of Civic Betterment Group Town Wide.

The Northend Community Club, a civic improvement organization, was started more than twenty-five years ago, when the north end was a rural section. Men of that section formed a club of which the charter members included George Hulse, William Rockwell, and Richard Missbach. Mr. Rockwell is the present president.

The first meetings were social gatherings held in the Montclair Heights Reformed Church, but with the growth of the north end, civic matters became the main interest of the club.

Most of the club's work has been the securing of benefits for the north end, among which were the new schools in that section, Mountainside Park, plazas at the stations at Mountain Avenue and at Upper Montclair, and the restriction of business zones of Upper Montclair.

The Northend Community Club was first to support zoning and has consistently fought all encroachments against zoning in any section of the town. The club has always worked in co-operation with the Watchung and Southend associations.
